Infringement and sanction regime on equal opportunities, non-discrimination and accessibility for people with disabilities in place Public Body that manages complaint about accessibility in place	Additional information: There are several sanctions regimes contained in the law from 28.11.2006 on equal treatment as well as in the accessibility legislation from 7.02.2022. The penal code also forbids discriminations. NO Additional information: The "disability division" of the Ministry of Family, Integration and the Greater Region can provide advice and guidance but does not manage complaints. Another department of that ministry, namely the "Office for Monitoring the Accessibility of Products and Services", referred to as "OSAPS", can also provide specific guidance, The Centre on Equal Opportunities and the National Disability Council also can provide advice and guidance.

Certification Body for accessible environments, products, or services in place	According to the national accessibility legislation every new public building project as well as every new housing project from a certain size on needs a mandatory accessibility certificate established by an architect or other specially agreed professional. Mandatory accessibility certificates must be established for all public buildings, new or existing, by January 1, 2032. The Office for Monitoring the Accessibility of Products and Services at the Ministry of Family, Integration and the Greater Region can deliver certification for products and services. "On demand" advice or labelling can be provided by organizations like ADAPTH and "Eurewelcome".
